

11/5/2019 Appointment

On the **11/5/2019** appointment, I again talk fast and narrate some things that have happened. At this appointment, I was not interested in talking in detail. At one point, I say "my mother is talking to Jenny, and I'm sure this hospital is the one who gave her the number." This appointment was another very brief appointment, and I cannot remember what else I said.

Cumulative Takeaways as of the 8/15/2019 and 11/5/2019 Appointments

- In **2018** (roughly **January** through **May**), I had to adjust my medication. My Zyprexa (Olanzapine) had been causing me increasingly severe cognitive impairment. I had described it as “dementia like symptoms”
- I called Atrium on **4/16/2019** and **4/17/2019**, to tell them that Jenny was up to no good. I tell her how Jenny is running scams and may try to get my medical records.
- On **4/21/2019**, I am involuntarily hospitalized. The petition described my claim that a workplace privacy violation occurred as “thinks that his friends are out to get him and that he is in immediate danger from them.” It makes several other claims, including that I have “delusional behaviors.” These claims are validated as false by Atrium Health, in a process that Kathy was a part of. Atrium concluded “we found nothing”, in reference to any symptoms of any mental health condition.
- This process involved numerous, very suspect details. The police officer was Jenny’s neighbor. The crisis counselor who went to the magistrate’s office with Jenny was Jenny’s personal friend. The one crisis counselor’s sole focus was “do you have a mental illness”, which she asked me repeatedly, with emphasis in her voice. Jenny lied to me and told me that the magistrate’s office was across the street from the hospital (why would she do this?). The officer wasn’t in possession of the petition. In reference to what happened with Wells Fargo, Jenny has a suspect text message with Tunny, which she is clearly lying about.
- I mention all of the above facts to Kathy during the **4/25/2019** through **11/5/2019** appointments. I repeat or reference many of these facts multiple times over this time period. None of the above facts make it to my notes.
- Atrium Health’s finance department is involved in very suspect behavior. Shirley claims to have a phone number that I do not know listed as an alternate contact. The alternate contact is Jenny, the girl who I claim has been using Atrium to run scams. She is the same person who filed a false pretense commitment petition. She is the same person whose personal number I have deauthorized a dozen times. Shirley claims to need my full social security number to remove Jenny’s phone number. Shirley claims I entered Jenny as an alternate contact when I did my intake paperwork. This isn’t reflected on Kathy’s system and this is aside from the fact that I did my intake paperwork in **2011**, 5 YEARS BEFORE I HAD EVEN MET JENNY.

- I also mention the above to Kathy, in our appointments, though it wasn't until after **11/5/2019** that I figured out that the only intake paperwork I had ever done was completed in **2011**. With the exception of a heavily watered-down comment on my **6/13/2019** notes that was again referenced on **6/24/2019**, this doesn't make it to my notes either.
- I tell Kathy that the officer had committed a crime because he didn't have the petition in his possession. I tell her that I looked it up, and he was looking at 3 years in prison.
- Very important, in reference to the above, is that my argument that the officer had committed a crime is a legal argument, and that it is (at that point in time) based solely on the fact that the officer didn't have the petition in his possession. He himself made this clear when he was transporting me.
- There is evidence of foul play on the custody order. The timestamps are entered as the exact same time. Kathy presumably finds this out early during the time period covered in this section. This doesn't make it to the notes either.
- During my inpatient stay, I was refused, twice, the request to delete or deauthorize numbers. I bring this up at least twice, to Kathy. I almost certainly bring it up to the nurse. It only appears on my notes after the second time, when I have given evidence of criminal behavior. The note that is entered doesn't reflect the actual (and much more incriminating) details of what had occurred.
- As of **5/31/2019**, my mother seems to be clearly involved in illegal contact with my hospital. This illegal contact continues. My mother is deceitful and will be more than happy to aid Atrium in covering up this illegal contact and Atrium's illegal sharing of information with her (and, of course, this is exactly what she does).
- As of **11/5/2019**, I have already introduced the idea that Jenny is talking to my mother, and I'm sure that Atrium Health is the one who gave her the number. This never makes it to the notes.
- As of **November**, and **December 2019**, Atrium Health is sweating bullets. Their corporate privacy team is very anxious when talking to me. My number soon becomes the number that everyone at the corporate privacy office knows **not** to answer. I become a focus for all of the behavioral health unit, and I have no doubt that I am the primary focus for their executives and other high-ranking staff. During and following these months, Atrium goes into loss aversion/cover my ass mode. They start working on weaseling out of the crimes they committed. You have to keep note of the dishonest nature of what occurs during and

following these months. You have to realize that they are up to no good, and that their words and communications cannot be taken at face value.
