It's more a matter of not being able to hide from them. How many doctors are the people at Wells Fargo better than? We've got I don't know how many from the hospital at age 18 and the place in newland that I went to for over 10 years. Then I sent the OIG a letter with a bunch more. Here we have yet another. Then, of course, I send you what the AI program replied to me. That program was given the medical licensing examination and scored 70%. What is the score of the people who work at Wells Fargo? What is the score of the senior manager who couldn't pass a high school level test on accounting, the subject matter of the work of the department he presides over?

I view it as highly likely that the criminals at Wells Fargo have hired their own experts, to examine the illegally obtained healthcare records that Wells Fargo dances around with in front of the regulators and authorities. Those experts have most likely agreed with Wells Fargo, if this has in fact happened.

You'll notice a trend here, that all the people who agree with Wells Fargo are 1. Facing prison time over their conduct towards me; and/or 2. Facing civil litigation, loss of funding, and being put in the news over their conduct towards me; and/or 3. incompetent, with no business even offering an opinion; and/or 4. Paid by Wells Fargo.

Wells Fargo's experts agree because that's what they're paid for. Any expert that doesn't agree will be fired on the spot. The only game* this bank knows how to win is a game that is rigged in its favor. This is because it has not had to play a game that is not rigged in its favor in a very, very long time.

You'll notice an opposite trend with the people who agree with me. They- 1. Are not paid to agree with me. 2. Often have a vested interest in not agreeing with me**. 3. In many cases do not even know me. They are just sharing their expertise on public forums, and their expertise will often confirm things that I have told you nearly verbatim.

*Im using an analogy. This is not a game. This is the cruel and merciless criminal abuse of a kindhearted man, and his asking for something that resembles justice.

**if the people at Broughton Hospital had any case to make that I was a "dangerous" person, they could have kept me longer, and their funding depends on them keeping as many patients as they can for as long as possible (according to what I've been told). The people and newland deemed me as no longer needing therapy when I was about 29. This is opposed to their financial interests, and they can also potentially be held liable for making the wrong decision about a patient.

At the bottom of this email are some screenshots from Twitter. I have extracted the quotes that mirror things that I have told the justice department.

“ This means, children believe everything that happens to them is because of them.” - remember that I told you that, as a child, I believed that my abuse said something about me, not about my caregiver.

“ This creates a deep internal conflict within Dylan. His father is a god-like figure who his survival depends on. Because of his age and level of emotional development, Dylan cannot objectively view his father.” - and I told you that this is because very young children are hardwired to see their caregivers as perfect (“a god-like figure”).

These 2 phenomena that I described to you are what she is referring to in this thread.

I'm uncertain as to what extent the justice department believes Wells Fargo's bullshit. I'm also uncertain to what extent Wells Fargo believes Wells Fargo's bullshit. I find it hard to believe that anyone could dupe themselves into believing this ridiculous nonsense. It seems more likely that you are both flailing around trying to come up with some remotely plausible or remotely defensible excuse for your behavior, and that you are conscious of the fact that you are being ridiculous and that you are deliberately making things up as you go along.

I'll keep beating this horse into the ground. It's just one more episode in this continuous shooting fish in a barrel exercise. I also don't know if Wells Fargo intends for these people that harass me on social media to be dead giveaways. If they do or if they don't, they are dead giveaways. I don't even bother entertaining most of them anymore.
