It is pointless to email you people. You do not want to help me and the more of what's going on that I fill you in on, it just creates another possibility of brutal criminal abuse of a disabled man. I can't take any more of this. This just gets forwarded to Wells Fargo, possibly without the Justice Department even looking at it. All the Wells Fargo people want to do is to dig in their heels and use the info I give them to make bullshit explanations for their crimes and coverup their crimes.

What needs to happen with this situation is that it needs to be delivered to the public in a preplanned, deliberate, controlled, well thought out way, and it would be very helpful if this controlled way of releasing this to the public was a multi step process that involved a process of desensitization. What I mean is that it is announced something like "justice department says it will be making some announcements on a situation involving Wells Fargo. The resolution of this is coming to a conclusion." Do things like this to slowly introduce what has happened.

We'd want to work on some way to make Wells Fargo come out better at the end of this. That could be part of the last announcement or an intermediate announcement. We don't want shareholders selling off and losing money. We also want the public pumped up about the soundness of the financial system. If there is a concern about why we're not filing charges, we could (correctly and accurately) reference the fact that I'm way too ill to endure a trial and that money is what I need most, because of my health problems, my disability, and my new friend and her family.

In this scenario, we could have this come out to be something constructive. At some point last year or the year before (maybe multiple points), I offered to lie for the US DOJ. I did this out of suffering and desperation. I no longer offer this. I think it would be a very good thing if I were to have a huge role in the final announcement and to deliver a large of part of it myself. What I'm good at is telling the truth, exactly how it is. I've gotten good at this especially over the past 22 to 24 years, and I've been good at it for a very long time, at this point. What I have found is that people's behavior is often indefensible, or at least it appears that way. There are some things that you can do wrong that people will never forgive you for. What you have to do is uncover the whole truth about your motives, the influences that affected you, and your limitations. That may be an incomplete list, but when you flesh out the whole picture and you do it accurately, the picture that emerges is that you are human, and this becomes the context in which your behavior is judged. What I have found is that people will always forgive for being human. I do not think that there is a single exception to this, you just have to confront your actions courageously. You have to admit things that it hurts to admit. When you do that, you make everyone in the room feel valued. Denying responsibility makes others feel unimportant. It's kind of an art form but I'm pretty good at it. I could help you.

But you're not interested in this. I have been trying to cooperate with people who have no interest in cooperating with me.

I will finish this final email later. I am getting very weak. I'll follow up later with the rest.
